Ryan himself identi-fies as bisexual. His mission is to break down the stigma and barriers that bisexual people face.

When he is not working with Carlow Pride, Ryan enjoys participating in local theatre groups and playing music. He has recently finished a degree in Applied Social Studies from Carlow College St Patricks and he is looking forward to what the future holds.

Rvan represents Carlow Pride Festival on the committee of the Ireland Pride Network, which is a network of pride organisers from around Ireland currently facilitated by the European Pride Organisers Association.

The struggles facing Neurodivergent people in Ireland - Alex Hayes

Neurodiversity is a term that covers a large number of neurological differences such as Autism, Bipolar, Dyspraxia, Dyslexia, OCD and more. While progress has been made in Ireland to understand and normalise those who are neurodiverse there are still many societal and systemic issues facing the community. In order to get a better understanding of these struggles I reached out to Joana Hermann and Nem Kearns, two of the founders of Neuro Pride Ireland.

"If we start listing them all, we'll be here all day!" says Joana. "It starts with not knowing that you are Neurodivergent in the first place. Not knowing means you go through life without access to supports, without your neuro-community and with a damaged

sense of self. You think you are defective when you are just different.

Children have to wait years to be assessed and there is virtually no way to get an adult diagnosis of, say, Autism or ADHD unless you go private and many of us can't afford that. If

you're lucky to get diagnosed there is very little support afterwards. It's mostly just "Here's your diagnosis - good luck!".

"One of the biggest issues, however, is the widespread use of Applied Behavioural Analysis (ABA), its cousin Positive Behavioural Support (PBS) and all other forms of behaviourist interventions. ABA was created by the same person who invented gay conversion 'therapy' and it still relies on those same principles even if it's been made "gentler". That says it all really. It's abusive compliance training, plain and simple, which has been shown to result in a more than 85% increased risk of developing

c-PTSD and a much greater likelihood of suicide afterwards, and we subject our children and our most vulnerable adults to it on a daily basis. Let's not even get into the deeply flawed and inhumane psychiatric system and history of institutionalisation in Ireland."

So what can we as members of the general public do to be allies?

"The motto of the wider Disabled communi-

er Disabled community is "Nothing About Us Without Us." Listen to and learn from Neurodivergent people. Don't talk over us. In general, be respectful and inclusive. If someone discloses their neurodivergence to you, that's a vulnerable moment. It's al-

most similar to coming out.

Don't react with disbelief or some platitude about how "we are all a little autistic". Just hold space. Ask them what it means to them and ask how you can support them. Don't assume every person has the same strengths and needs. "Presume Competence." says Nem "If someone doesn't speak using their mouth, it doesn't mean they don't understand. Someone might speak using a device like a tablet or picture cards. Or use gestures. Respect all communication."

The second Neuro Pride
Festival is happening online this year from the 4th
- 8th of August, there will
be a variety of zoom meetups around crafts, games,

parenting, activism, mental health and more. "We also host an LGBTQ+ meet. There is a huge crossover between the Neurodivergent and LGBTQIA+ communities. More than two-thirds of Neurodivergent people surveyed identify as LGBTO+ and we're a large part of the trans community. It is great to see our communities come together to advocate for all our rights and stand up against those who seek to exclude us, we will work together to build communities that embrace and uplift us all," savs Joana Hermann and Nem Kearns of Neuro Pride Ireland, To. learn more visit neuropride.ie






